Manly Council Chambers was the centrepiece of civic activities. Here the building is the venue for the 25th Anniversary of the Manly Community Environment Committee held on Sunday 26th June 2016. Constructed in 1937, it is a mixture of a neo-classical exterior, with an art-deco interior. As the staff numbers in the building decline, what will be the future of one of the most elegant Town Halls in Sydney?

All Change !

A famous British Prime-minister said "a week is a long time in politics", so a month must represent an eternity!

As most residents will have seen, the State Government's consideration of reviewing their Council amalgamations policy appears to have mostly evaporated. While the country councils were released, there were reports of lobbyists and pollsters working overtime to enable the State Government to continue the push to merge local Councils in Sydney.

Thus the potential offer of a poll to test the community's views of amalgamation on the Northern Beaches has been withdrawn. As previously reported, there is an intense dislike of the amalgamation by residents of Pittwater. However despite the withdrawal there remain other options - including the community conducting its own poll.

Manly Staff Departures (to Strathfield)

We previously reported the former General Manager, Mr Henry Wong and one of the ex-Deputy General Managers, Mr Steve Clements, left Council under pressure, and ended up at Strathfield Council. Since then it is reported around another 10 ex-Manly senior and financial staff have left the amalgamated Council, to join Mr Wong's team at Strathfield.

Some of the reported departed staff were well known to Manly Councillors including Jenny Nascimento (former CFO), Raymund Banister (HR), James Ng (Legal Counsel) and George Malesevic (Engineer). Kathryn Falye (prev Human Services and Facilities) previously left Manly Council and is reported currently there, and Mary Rawlings (Risk Manager) is about to go. The other ex-Deputy, Beth Lawson, is about to take long service leave and is another departing under pressure to unknown pastures.

For the record four senior Manly Staff were given high-level management roles in the new Council. These are Natasha

Schultz, Helen Lever, Nathan Rogers (IT) and Mick Darda (Events).

So while many Council services appear to continue for Manly residents, remember the behind-the-scenes human cost of the amalgamation in terms of staff stress and uncertainty in having to change jobs, locations and in some cases effectively being sacked. Then think of all the local knowledge we have lost from the Council with these departures.

Its a well known issue that Councils under administration tend to see very high staff losses. No doubt some will coldly portray these losses as "savings", but that is a bit one dimensional. What about the impact on the public's service? What about the staff members as people?

Maintenance of Manly Council Assets

The performance of the amalgamated Northern Beaches Council on capital works projects was a topic discussed during the February FB Precinct meeting. Many residents considered the new Council's performance on major works within the precinct was fair to poor.

For example the Marine Parade walk repairs were considered to be done to an excellent standard of finish, but took way too long to get underway. The deferral of the Fairy Bower Pool works and ten months to start reconstruction of the storm demolished FB pool toilet block and change room(s) was considered unsatisfactory. As one local resident colourfully put it at the meeting "how long does it take to build a brick s***house?"

This then lead to discussion of the new Council's performance on other public works outside the FB Precinct. Firstly mentioned was the continued poor presentation of principal Manly Council buildings, such as the partially demolished pergola off the front entry to the Manly Art Gallery and the sad looking peeling paint on the exterior of the Manly Council Chambers - particularly windowsills and parapets. The Chambers are normally attended to promptly,

with major works carried out over the holiday season when everyone is on their break. (The Art Galley and Council Chambers need for works were reported some months ago using Council's Customer Service Request on-line reporting system.)

A great deal of energy is being put into new Council branding such as new NB Council logos on the glass entry doors on Manly Town Hall, but apparently not for basic building maintenance. It raises questions about management and funding priorities under the new Council.

Next was the state of the East Esplanade reserve. Once again this poured soil and grass into the harbour during a recent storm, due to lack of a small retaining wall on the harbour-side of the grass adjacent the path. (Also ignoring the overuse issue.) A motion to fix this was passed by Manly Council at the April 2016 Ordinary Meeting last year, and yet

there appears to have been no action taken on it.

Some residents have asked if these are just transient rearrangement of administration problems, or if there is just currently no one in Manly (senior executives nor Councillors) with a sense of civic pride and sufficient influence to ensure proper maintenance of Manly's Council assets.

One hopes this deferral of works activity is not due to artificial amalgamation savings being considered more important than maintenance expenditure. Many residents might well consider it more productive for Council to refocus on the basics of carpentry, concrete and painters, in place of the current preoccupation with logos, letterheads, and new signage.

Fairy Bower Pool Amenities Block

As previously mentioned, this was raised at the February FB Precinct meeting, with a number of residents well away from the location of the building receiving notifications for the proposed works. Even the notification sign was put up in the wrong place - near the fallen rock sculpture on the Marine Parade walkway!

Following the meeting we have reviewed the design by our talented ex-Manly in-house Council architect *Michael Biddolph*. Its going back in the same place. Interested residents will be able to see the documents and drawings from a link on the front page of the FB Precinct web site. However the DA consultation period has now closed.


In summary the design is a similar sized (slightly larger) building to the original, with two unisex and one disabled loos, and two separate change cubicles. My only professional concern is whether the block-work walls are going to be strong enough, and anchored down well enough, to prevent a repeat of the storm side-wave demolition that destroyed the previous building in June last year.

In fact the building really needs to be built of cast concrete like a WW2 bunker (bombproof equals waveproof). The same issue applies to the small unit paving proposed for

the walkway in front of it - will this withstand the storm seas that reach this location, given the previous concrete paving slabs were just thrown about by the sea?

It might have been a one in 25 year storm, but we need to design for this to happen again, with the new building able to withstand the sea this time.

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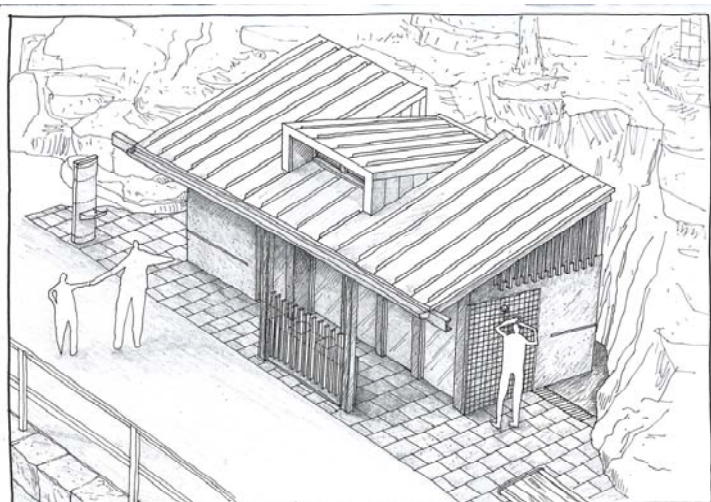
Yes its that time of year again, the Manly Environment Centre's **Eco Awards** are fast approaching.
